


# Discover your past at the library

#### Ancestry Library Edition available at Peace Library System libraries

Peace Library System is pleased to announce that Ancestry Library Edition, a top-rated genealogical online resource, is now available at member libraries across the Peace region. Valuable for hobbyists and professionals alike, with Ancestry Library Edition, anyone can dive into their past and learn about their ancestors. Library users now have easy access to billions of records, including over 60 million Canadian records such as censuses, military records, birth, marriage and death records, immigration records and more.

Ancestry Library Edition is powered by Ancestry.com and brings the world's most popular consumer online genealogy resource to the library, for library patrons to use for free. To access Ancestry Library Edition, patrons must be in the library, either using a library computer or a personal device connected to library wi-fi. Once in the library, users click on the Ancestry link on their library's website to be taken directly to Ancestry Library Edition, which features an intuitive search interface, a Learning Center, and downloadable charts and forms to help get users started with

In addition, we have added a new World Book resource called Early World of Learning to support early literacy for preschoolers. This is available to patrons in the library or remotely.

#### **PLSB Review of Public Libraries in Schools**

In 2015, a representative from the Public Library Services Branch will be visiting each public library that is situated in a school. This follows up from a mail survey conducted in 2013. The goal is to evaluate the different models of service delivery in school-housed public libraries, and then put together a toolkit to help library boards that may be considering partnership with a school.

# >> Spotlight on Programming





## Building Readers, One Block at a Time

The possibilities are endless when you bring kids and stories together, and Lego is a great complement to that mix. At the Grimshaw Municipal Library, we have been developing Lego programming, including Block Parties. Here's how we run our Lego Block Parties—maybe you can start running your own!

Most of our Block Parties follow a similar format. They are drop-in programs and no more than 90 minutes long. Each Block Party has a theme, which could be seasonal (ie. winter, Halloween, the Olympics) or based on a subject (ie. underwater, sports, animals). The participants build alone or in groups, depending on the numbers. One of the keys to drop-in programs is flexibility.

We have 10 kits of Lego, each with two large base plates and about 1,300 pieces per kit. Everyone starts with the same blocks, and kids seem to appreciate knowing that "all the good pieces" aren't in another kit. We don't have any franchised Lego kits (not even Harry Potter!) as we wanted to make sure kids didn't approach the Lego with the attitude that their creation had to be a specific building or vehicle.

Once the kids and families are settled with their kit, they hear a story. No shuffling the blocks while the story is being read! When the story is finished, they get their assignment or challenge. Our Block Party in January had an ocean theme. After hearing I'm

the Biggest Thing in the Ocean! by Kevin Sherry, they were asked to dig through the bins, find all the blue pieces and build a giant squid. A challenge like that is usually completed in about 20 to 25 minutes, depending on the ages.

The next book was *The Shark Who was Afraid of Everything!* by Brian James. The challenge afterwards was to build something the shark in the story was afraid of on one base plate, and then on the other, participants built something they were afraid of. Tar monsters! Needles! Zombies! Our last story that day was *Only One You*, by Linda Kranz, and from that came the challenge to build a fishy self-portrait.

We did have other books prepared for this party, too, but they were geared to an older group of readers than the one we had attending. If older kids would've attended, we would have used passages from one of the Jack Sparrow books, *Billy Twitters and His Blue Whale Problem*, by Mac Barnett, and some non-fiction books about sea monsters. When it is an all ages, drop-in program, you do need to be flexible!

Our Lego programming at the Grimshaw Municipal Library has been so educational for the staff and we are regularly surprised by the combinations the kids come up with. Hopefully your patrons will surprise you too! >>

#### **IT Staffing**

department here at PLS! With any transition, it is very easy for things to get lost in the shuffle. #### **Apps**

I am sure that most of you have heard from patrons (likely those who own iPhones, iPads, or other Apple devices) saying that their TRACpac app has stopped working. Sadly, one of the major iOS updates in the fall caused the TRACpac app to break; however, the app is still working for Android devices. The existing app is the final version being produced and has already been removed from the Apple store, so the problems will not be fixed. That being said, there is a shiny new app coming. TRAC is working with a vendor called Boopsie to create the new app. The new app will have more features and will be available for more devices—Blackberry users may now feel free to celebrate! The launch date of the new app has yet to be determined, but we will let you know more information as we have it.

#### **Polaris Quirks & New Stuff**

The Polaris upgrade has come and gone. To say that it could have gone smoother is a bit of an understatement. Unfortunately, we were plagued with some server issues which meant that the automatic distribution of the new software wasn't possible. Thank you to everyone for your patience. And I'm sure you will all join me in thanking the IT staff at Northern Lights Library System for helping with the manual installation of the new Polaris software!

With the new version of Polaris comes a small glitch regarding postal codes. It seems that Polaris has gotten a little confused when it comes to Canadian postal codes and is actually trying to read them as American zip codes. Any time you try to update an address, you will see an error saying "The ZipCode is not present/is invalid. Please re-enter data." Polaris has put an extra space at the end of the postal code, which is what is causing

the error. Just delete the extra space (or if you want to make absolutely sure, just delete the entire postal code and type it in again) and you'll be able to save with no problem.



The new version of Polaris comes with the highly anticipated OverDrive and 3M integration. What does this mean? It means awesome things! Previously, patrons have had to leave TRACpac to search for eBooks or audiobooks, check them out, or place holds on the OverDrive or 3M website or apps. With the new integration, all that will be able to be done through TRACpac. This feature is coming soon and keep an eye on Pecans for more information.

## Family History Day a success at GPPL

On Saturday, February 14 we held a large Family History Day event at the Grande Prairie Public Library to celebrate the Family Day weekend and to promote genealogical research in Grande Prairie. The event was held with two of our library's partners: the Grande Prairie Branch of the Alberta Genealogical Society and the South Peace Regional Archives. This was actually the second time that a Family History Day event like this was held, but it was the first time that our library had participated. The event went all day long and consisted of eight free workshops, a number of research stations, and a trade show.

We began planning about four months in advance, as coordinating an event with so much going on between three different groups requires a lot of preparation. Advertising for the event began six weeks prior, with mentions in our printed and email newsletters, posters in the library, a posting in our online calendar, flyers and bookmarks given to patrons, press releases, and paid newspaper advertisements. We wanted to reach a broad audience to try attract some new people to family history research, and so diversity was key to our advertising strategy. Between all of that, I think it is safe to say that the word got out there about our event.

The workshops were varied, with something to appeal to everybody—not just seasoned genealogists. Most workshops were centered on doing research to trace back family history, while others included information on preserving and documents and photos scrapbooking, and one presentation was on improving family photography so that future generations will have great records of their history too. We were lucky to have



a lot of different spaces for programming as well as access to the large event venue, Teresa Sargent Hall. We held the workshops two at a time in our adjacent Rotary programming rooms, with the trade show in the Teresa Sargent Hall and our research stations spread between the Hall and our special Isabel Campbell Room, which is dedicated to local history and ancestral research. The trade show stayed open throughout the day, and people wandered through between sessions. The research stations were also manned throughout the day, and they were kept busy as participants learned more about how to find out about their pasts.

The event was a great success and participants left feeling that they had learned a lot and had a great time doing it. The biggest factor in accomplishing this event was our library's partnerships with other organizations in Grande Prairie. The Alberta Genealogical Society brought a wealth of knowledge on family history

research that takes years to learn, as well as a long list of contacts for potential speakers and volunteers. South Peace Regional Archives likewise brought years of knowledge and experience to the event. Libraries tend to do things a certain way, and even when trying to think outside of the box, old habits can be hard to break. Partnering with other groups in the community forces us out of our comfort zone to try something new, and the result, like this one, is often quite spectacular. >>

## Renovated St. Isidore Library re-opens

It is with great excitement that the new St. Isidore Library—housed in the newly renovated Cultural Centre—opened its doors for business once again to serve the francophone population of the region. After much anticipation, La Bibliothèque de St. Isidore opened its doors to its newly expanded library of 1,500 square feet in October 2014, becoming fully operational in December 2014. Our library hours are Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays from 9:00–4:30 pm and Tuesdays from 9:00-6:30 pm.

We are so fortunate that Northern Sunrise County was able to donate the funding to make this expansion possible. The friends of the library committee believe that the renovations will also have a positive impact on the St. Isidore area by offering a warm and friendly setting for a variety of educational and fun programs for children and adults of all ages. By expanding our collections and having access to other library collections in the province we feel this is very good, not only for the francophone culture, but for all other cultures as well.

#### A Brief History of Bibliothèque de St. Isidore

Thanks to the initiative of a small but dedicated group of women from the hamlet of St. Isidore, a committee was formed near the end of the 1970s to study the possibility of establishing a French library in the community. Serving on the newly formed committee were: Ann Medima-Lavoie, Marie Lavoie, Armande Bérubé-Lavoie and Susane Duchesne.

The library first opened its doors in 1981 in the loft of the St. Isidore Church with a small collection of old books from the school district and gifts and donations from ID #17 (our improvement district) Recreation Board. As the church loft quickly became too small, a decision was made to move the library to the new cultural centre in the spring of 1987.

New acquisitions quickly began to include CD-ROMS, CDs, videocassettes, as well as books on tape. In 1998 the library became a member of Peace Library System, providing members with access to the collections of other libraries in the region. From Dynix to Polaris in 2008, La Bibliothèque de St. Isidore has done its very best to keep up with the new technological advances available by offering a broader accessibility to computers, wireless, eBooks and many other services.

Marie Lavoie, our library chairperson, still serves on the committee after 30 years of devoted service. Other persons on the board include: Odile Allard, treasurer; Christine Nadeau, counsellor, volunteer, staff; Monique Bergeron, counsellor,





volunteer, staff; and Véronique Lavoie, staff, secretary. We are also thankful to have Suzanne Lambert who helps out as a volunteer when she gets some spare time.

Our goal to create a welcoming environment for residents to gather together to learn, celebrate and enjoy a variety of cultural events and activities in the community centre has always been at the forefront of our existence. In the future and with the continued support of Northern Sunrise County and Peace Library System, we hope to continue to offer services that reflect changing technologies, new knowledge and up-to-date and interesting collections for all ages. >>

#### Fox Creek Municipal Library

This has been a busy quarter for the Fox Creek Municipal Library. In November, the library participated in the Town's Festival of Trees with our **Lego My Lego Tree** (left). It was decorated with hand-crafted wooden Lego heads, Lego kits, Lego books and Lego garlands on a bluetooth-lighted tree. It brought in lots of bids and was only outdone at the last minute by the Wine Bottle Tree. We had lots of fun making many of the decorations and displaying it.

On Family Literacy Day, we partnered with our Community Resources Centre, Literacy with contests and promotions. We held our annual basket of books contests and saw 1,693 books read. Winners of the draws were thrilled with their prizes. Check out our **Literacy Ball we created using Makedo pieces** (centre top) that we learned about at the conference. We also brought in **Mary Ann Lippiatt of "Story in My Pocket"** for a day of school presentations for students from playschool through grade six and for an evening presentation for adults and child caregivers (right top and bottom). It was a lot of fun watching Mary Ann in her different costumes, telling and drawing stories, singing and acting a variety of activities. We all loved it.

We also presented 35 grade four students with their own hardcover copy of "Hey Canada" to encourage their use of the library and to acknowledge their Fractured Fairy Tale projects. This is the 13th year of this incentive program. The CIBC has sponsored this program for several years now.

We lost our Time for Tots and evening shift librarian in October but have gained two others. We found a replacement for the Time for Tots program and will be training another for our evening/weekend shift. We are excited with the number of views our Time for Tots Webisodes are getting. YouTube views are up over 15,000 with more than 63 subscribers. Many of them seem to be using it as a method of learning English. We add an episode weekly and have still not run out of ideas.

If you have heard of Angry Birds, you might want to slip down (or up) to Fox Creek on March 12 for our annual Family Games Night. We are adding a life size Angry Birds game to our collection of giant games and other fun games and activities. With tons of prizes, hot chocolate and cookies, this continues to be an evening that most families in the community look forward to.

## Apply for the 2015 Minister's Awards

Do you have an outstanding library service? How about applying for the 2015 Minister's Awards for **Excellence in Public Library Service.** 

In 2014, the library boards for Calgary, Fox Creek, Metro Federation (Edmonton, St. Albert, Strathcona County, Fort Saskatchewan) and Innisfail received awards for, respectively, the Grow a Reader mobile app, Time for Tots webisodes, Metro Edmonton ME Card service and Beginner Robotics program.

There are a few exciting changes to the awards for 2015. The categories have been simplified, making for easier applications, and there is a new YOU Libraries Award, to be adjudicated by a popular vote open to all Albertans. All applications/nominations that meet the Minister's Awards criteria will be automatically eligible for the YOU Libraries Award. A jury will continue to pick up to four winning submissions that demonstrate excellence and/or innovation in library service.
