#### 2016 - 2018 Plan of Service

Watch for Peace Library System's new 2016-2018 Plan of Service. It will be presented to the Peace Library Board on November 28 and sent out to members in early January. It incorporates strategies to assist member libraries and boards in key areas identified in the needs assessment. Thank you all very much for your valuable input. The staff here at PLS will continue our commitment to support your library and help you offer excellent services in your community.

### **GST Procedures**

Peace Library System (PLS) was granted municipal status for GST purposes through the Canada Revenue Agency (CRA). Effective July 1, 2015, PLS no longer charges GST on invoices to its members. The monthly Polaris statements will no longer identify the GST spent as libraries will no longer need to track it for rebate purposes. Beginning in 2016, PLS will consolidate member libraries' Full and Partial accounts into one account. The entries on the financial statements will continue to identify the types of deposits and purchases going through your account. Separate sub-accounts may still be set up to track special purchases, such as those made through a grant program.


### **Safety Audit**

We recently had a certified safety officer from a local company review PLS policies, procedures and forms relating to employee health and safety. This was a very useful exercise which will help PLS improve its policies and procedures, update its reporting forms, and encourage staff to respond appropriately when safety is an issue.

### **Early Childhood Library Services Symposium**

The Public Library Services Branch is offering a symposium called Little Ones in Libraries on February 25-26, 2016 in Edmonton. It is targeted to staff and managers from all public libraries in Alberta, and we encourage as many as possible to attend. Topics include the science of early childhood development; the public library's role in early childhood development; potential partnerships; and related information. This fits in nicely with Peace Library System's goal to support member libraries with early literacy. In 2016, training funds have been allocated to assist smaller libraries in attending the symposium.

### **Rural Libraries Conference**

The Rural Libraries Conference saw 146 delegates, slightly up from last year, and we were thrilled that 32% (46 delegates) were first-timers! Public library staff accounted for 52% of the attendance, school library staff 23%, and trustees and councilors 23%. ### **Salary Survey**

The 2015 Salary Survey of Peace Library System public libraries was sent out on November 6, so we hope you've had a chance to review it. We gathered data on guestions ranging from benefits to salaries to library training. Seventyone percent of public libraries responded to the survey. A summary of the responses showed that hours open to the public and paid staff hours have remained stable. There have been improvements to the pay scale for all staff, and the average wage for library managers has risen by \$1.96 per hour since the 2011 survey. A quarter of the library managers who responded receive some sort of employee benefits; little correlation was shown between years of experience and salary; and between library training and salary.

#### **ME Libraries**

The ME Libraries initiative celebrated its oneyear anniversary on October 1. ME Libraries allows patrons to register online to use their local public library card in-person at over 300 public libraries across Alberta for free. In its first year, there were 2,534 registrations from around Alberta to come visit TRAC libraries, and patrons of TRAC libraries placed 14,560 registrations to visit other libraries around Alberta (each patron can register a number of times depending on how many libraries they wish to visit, so this is not a count of individuals, but rather of registrations).




call! Emergencies, also known as **critical functions**, are problems logging in to Polaris, checking items in or out, patron registration, or searching in TRACpac.



#### Polaris Error – reminder method is email

Since the Polaris upgrade in early October, you have probably seen Polaris pop-up with an error message during patron registration letting you know that **Reminder notices Option is e-mail**. This is a result of a new feature in Polaris 5.0. Patrons are now able to opt out of reminders (Almost overdue, Patron record expiration, and Inactive patron) which are only sent by email. So if your patron has not provided an email for their account and you have not checked to exclude them from these reminders, you will get the pop-up. You will also see this pop-up message when removing an email address from an account and not opting out of the reminders. This is not a deal-breaker though. Library staff are able to click yes, get past this pop-up, and save the new patron account.





### >> From Grande Prairie Public Library

day basis. It's easy enough to see when you consider the line ups for the last Harry Potter book, or the way Game of Thrones has become a common conversational piece, so that even people who haven't read the books or watched the television have heard the phrase "Winter is Coming" said in dire tones (probably all through the month of October). turned to movies becoming blockbusters, and books turned to television shows are some of the most commonly watched shows on television. Part of this



popularity is due to the fact that they already had loyal fans eager to watch adaptations and consume new media of the thing they love, but part of it comes down to the fan's enthusiasm being contagious because it is visible, it is public, and it's about things right within our walls.

It's a pithy way to put it, but when planning LibriCon 2015 our mantra was "You like stuff? We like stuff too! And we like people who like stuff." It's simply put, but what it comes down to is that there is a sense of openness and pride associated with enjoying comic books, spy movies, and young adult dystopian books, to name a few, that brings fans right to our doorstep. Where better to find out where "Winter is Coming" comes from firsthand than by checking it out at the library? We have options, even: do you want to find out in DVD format? Book format? Audiobook format? eBook format? Graphic novel? We are well aware of the impact these adaptations have on circulation for items in our collection, ranging from Fifty Shades of Grey's prolonged popularity to sudden requests for the Giver.

We're also thinking of what this means in terms of programming. I am a huge geek who spends a lot of personal time delving into online communities, but while it is advantageous to know certain things about fan engagement first-hand, it's also not impossible to run programs based on fan engagement with very little knowledge of it. Like the people who understand that "Winter is Coming" is a quote from Game of Thrones, we can all look at a list of YA books being turned into movies in 2016 and anticipate which ones will take. When it comes down to it, programs that cater towards fans

I have, and will, stand on tabletops to reinforce the Library as a are really just providing space for them to be themselves with Geek Space, because we already are and it's time to embrace it. It is other people with similar interests. That's the Library's bread and now a norm for people to openly celebrate their enjoyment of the butter, and one of the major factors we took into consideration things they like, and they are doing so in public forums on a day to when planning LibriCon as a day-long series of programs and community engagement.

> (I would like to add as an aside: this year the planning committee was comprised of 5 members of our programming staff through all departments and only 2 of them identify as geeks.)

> The schedule for LibriCon 2015 contained a showing of Ant-Man, a trivia contest, the Cosplay Fashion Show contest, a Role Playing Dating Game, crafts, colouring, outside experts and partners, and high staff involvement. This year, LibriCon expanded into the Theresa Sargent Hall, which is a city-owned hall in the Montrose Cultural Centre, the building that houses the Library. This allowed us to invite in local comic book stores as vendors, but more interestingly, invite local artisans and artists to sell their wares. Since vendors are a huge component of Comic Cons, and community engagement/partnerships falls into our strategic plan, one of our main goals for 2015 was to figure out a way to make it happen when working with Library policy restrictions. We had local experts from the comic book stores running tournaments with us, including: Wii gaming, Yu-Gi-Oh cards, and Magic!, which took a lot of the pressure off of staff, and two of our partners also agreed to be sponsors.

We're estimating between 500-600 people attended this year, up from 300-400 from last year. Unpacking the statistics from LibriCon is a challenge considering so many people were there to socialize rather than attend programs and spent a lot of time in the Hall, but some of our most included popular events the movie (60), the trivia contest (40), and a Doctor Who sonic screwdriver craft (45). The Cosplay Fashion Show was the main featured program of the day, with 70 entries, including groups to round the number of entries up to about 100, and approximately 2-300 in the audience. We followed it up with the Role Playing Dating



Game, which was also a huge success with 9 contestants and 80 people in the audience - the basic idea was to run the Dating Game with people role playing as their costumes and it was a hit!

We're looking forward to 2016 LibriCon on October 15.



### >> Rural Libraries Conference

This year's Rural Libraries Conference took place at the Pomeroy Hotel and Conference Centre on September 24 and 25, 2015 and was a big success. The conference itself had 146 registered delegates, up from 138 in 2014. Keynote speakers John Pateman and Karen Bass were very well received, and a number of helpful sessions were offered for public and school librarians and trustees on a wide variety of topics.
