# >> From the Director



It was great to see so many of you at the Rural Libraries Conference (RLC) in September. We had a great turn-out, inspiring keynote speakers and many excellent workshops. The preconference Blanket Exercise and the presentations by Richard Van Camp were thought–provoking and will help move us forward in the reconciliation process. Thanks to Emma Stewart for coordinating a great conference, and to

other staff who helped make it a success.

#### **Senior Manager Updates**

I'm pleased to report two new appointments at the senior management level. Janet Ayles has been appointed to the new position of IT and Technical Services Manager effective November 1, 2017. She will oversee both the IT Services and Technical Services areas, which she has been doing in an acting capacity since May.

Katherine Wiebe, Consulting Services Manager, has been appointed as Assistant Director effective November 15, 2017. In this capacity, Katherine will take on responsibility for Peace Library System operations in the absence of the Director and will participate more fully in policy development, strategic planning, and the budgetary process.

I am pleased to have Janet and Katherine take on these new roles, and I know they will fulfill their new responsibilities extremely well.

#### **General Library Awareness Marketing Campaign**

Following the colorful and catchy back-to-school "Get Going at Your Local Library" campaign, we will be providing library staff with some general promotional images and ideas to be used year-round. These are now available on the PLS website for your use.

Early in 2018 we will roll out a new campaign where we will focus on the "library without walls" concept, and specific services you can get 24/7.

#### **Library Services for Our Indigenous Neighbours**

While the focus of last year's Indigenous Populations Grant funding was on general awareness, education, and region-wide initiatives, the focus of this year's grant has been on building collections and implementing library-specific initiatives to reach out to and attract Indigenous patrons. Libraries have spent about \$60,000 on excellent materials for their collections. This includes a wide range of titles for children, teens and adults. Seventeen libraries applied for funding for special projects or programs. These include special summer events, early literacy initiatives, Indigenous art work, Indigenous artifacts, books, recording elders' stories, and programs such as beading, hand drums, dream catchers, guilting and the blanket exercise. We funded readings by Métis author, storyteller and artist, Aaron Paquette in three locations across the region. We are in the process of building book blocks to lend to libraries and will be adding to our eBook collection.

Samm Mercer and Emma Stewart will be attending a meeting of Indigenous Liaison people from across the province in early December. A meeting of our own library advisory committee will be held in early 2018 to discuss progress and next steps.

#### **Consulting Visits**

#### **Stats Gathering**

If you haven't done so already, now is the time for public libraries to gather some "typical week" statistics for the annual report to the Public Services Branch. The Annual Report to the Branch is due the end of February, but you need to gather your statistics in the 2017 year. If you are uncertain what statistics you need to gather, give Katherine a call or drop her an email. Katherine will provide one-to-one webinar training for new library managers (and refreshers to others who want it) starting in late January and throughout February to walk you through accessing and completing the annual report form.

# >> Searching with Sherlock




#### Searching (and finding) in Polaris

Hello everyone! Here begins the first in a multi-part series on searching the Polaris Database!

First for some basics:




1. Open "Find Tools". In the Cataloguing drop down list, the top five choices on the list open find tools. These have pre-set defaults by Polaris with the Choice name identifying the pre-set following:



Explore the Object drop downs on the "Find Tools" launched on can be displayed or sorted in the Find Tool window. the other drop down menues under Patron Services and Circulation. All the "Find Tools" are named by the "Object" of the Watch for Searching with Sherlock in 2018! Merry Christmas, search + the value in the "Search By" field. The Object defines what you are looking for and the "Search By field" tells the tool how to find it.

2. In this Bibliographic Record Find Tool, you can read in the top left corner HOW you want to search, or you can see that default value (ISBN) in the "Search By" field.



object of your search. If you open a Bibliographic Record Find This field also has a drop down list so you can ask the find tool to tool, you can change the object of your search to any of the look for the object of your search in a myriad of ways. Note the scroll bar on the side of the list: More than meets the eye!

- 3. Note the tabs (like index cards in a recipe box) running along the top of the find tool: General, Settings, Scoping, Branches, Collections and Databases. Two of these (Branches and Collections) can be of great use to you! For example, choosing just your branch on the first tab (after "unselecting "ALL") is a very useful parameter. Watch for it in future lessons in this series!
- 4. Finally, there is an important set of key strokes to learn before we begin: The Control key, the Shift key and the letter A key, held down simultaneously. This combination is called "the Karate Chop" and is essential for large searches. Sometimes your search results in one object being found, but in this enormous database, sometimes the result of your search is a big list, not all of which






#### Polaris 5.6

The new version of Polaris will come with a few new features. There are no major changes



to the Polaris staff client in this version, with most of the changes centred around TRACpac or Leap. In TRACpac, the look is a bit different with a much more responsive design (way better for you mobile users). Leap comes with the ability to create and delete record sets and item records. Log in and check out the new features!



#### **ME Libraries**

ME Libraries has been repaired and is working properly again. We have been able to do some pre-testing before the upgrade to Polaris 5.6 and have determined that there will be no interruption of service.



#### **Help Desk**

Please submit any non-critical problems to the helpdesk. The helpdesk can be reached by email at helpdesk@peacelibrarysystem.ab.ca or via the website at help.peacelibrarysystem.ab.ca.

If you are experiencing a critical problem, please call us directly (after hours, please reach out to the Afterhours support at YRL – 1-877-452-8722). Critical problems can be defined as:

- errors when searching TRACpac
- unable to login to Polaris
- errors when checking items out to a patron
- if you can't connect to the internet (YRL staff might not be able to help with the internet and you may have to wait for PLS staff).



#### **Did You Know?**

Your patrons are able to get their notifications in so many different ways. The traditional print notices and email notices are turned on for your patrons by default. However, there is the option to turn on telephony. Telephony gives your patrons the option to receive automated telephone notices or even text messages. Notices for holds and overdue items can be delivered directly to your patron's cell phone! If you have any questions about telephony or would like to have it turned on, please let me know.

## >> From Grande Prairie Public Library

#### **Try Something New**

computer. It consisted of a clip art hamburger with the caption skill level. I'm an average juggler, painter, coder, and origami "There are no sacred cows in libraries. Try something new."



I guarantee some of the library staff members reading that statement thought "Wait a minute! What about intellectual freedom? What about patron privacy?" Others probably worried about the prospect of library users eating and drinking at the public computer and what constant keyboard replacement would do to their limited technology budgets.

Okay, both of those concerned readers are right, but the point of my sign remains. Sometimes the habits that bind libraries and their staff members are stronger than the glue that binds pages into the books on our shelves. "We've always done things this way" isn't good enough anymore. Not when the world has changed around libraries. What's more, we can no longer allow fear to guide our program offerings.

Simply put, it can be scary to start a new program when you're not completely confident in your skill level. But take heart. There are a number of factors working in your favour.

The first factor is the Clarke Effect. Arthur C. Clarke once noted that any sufficiently advanced technology is indistinguishable from magic. In my experience the same can be said regarding skill. Just so long as you're more skilled than the people you're

A few years back I made a small sign to put up next to my instructing, you'll seem to be an expert regardless of your actual folder, but I've been able to successfully run programs in all four areas simply because I knew more than the attendees. professional juggler would laugh at my skill level, but to someone who has only ever tried to juggle two balls, my ability to keep four in the air for a minute is amazing.

> The second factor is related to the first. Library staff members can (and should) use phrases like "for beginners" and "the basics" when necessary to describe programs. Those phrases help set reasonable expectations for attendees and indirectly ensure that the staff member running the program will be the most skilled individual in the room.

> Time constraints also help in a strange way. As long as you have a polished complete item to show off as an example when the program begins, attendees will forgive a lesser version you produce as a demonstration during the program itself. After all, you're splitting your time between instructing and producing your own item - what can they expect when you only had half the time to produce your own? The attendees don't need to know that your example displayed at the beginning of the program was your seventh attempt and that it took you six hours to create.

> To sum up, I strongly encourage you to watch YouTube, explore Pinterest, and consider bringing your hobbies into your libraries. Teach a nail art class, build mini catapults, paint landscapes, or even play some video games.

> Look out your library's windows and think of something new to try. I bet you won't see any sacred cows nearby.



# >> Spotlight On: Lynda.com!


Peace Library System is very proud to now be able to offer **Lynda.com** free for your library patrons!



Learning Paths are dedicated to a specific career and job title so patrons can work their way through tutorials that teach them the skills they need to have in order to succeed in the field! These paths include certificates that you can link and share to your social media accounts, including LinkedIn.

Video players on a browser include a table of contents, the ability to bookmark sections, the ability to take notes and timestamp those notes to the video. Each video has a transcript that is searchable and that lights up as the video works its way through the text. You can adjust the play speed of the video, add closed captions, and even create a reminder extension for your Google, Outlook, Apple or Yahoo calendars to make sure you stay on track with your learning.

#### **McLennan Municipal Library**


Thanks to the Indigenous Grant, McLennan Municipal Library was able to start an after-school program. Here is some STEM fun with littleBits.




# >> Author Tour

#### Minister's Awards for Excellence **Public Library Service**

The Public Library Services Branch is pleased to announce the call for nominations for the annual Minister's Awards for Excellence in Public Library Service. These awards formally recognize great services at public libraries and promote knowledge-sharing within Alberta's library community.

There is a maximum of four awards granted each year. Awards are granted to the board of the library or system board delivering the service being recognized. The recipients will be determined based on their demonstrated example of excellence and/or innovation in delivering library services. The service under consideration for an award must respond to documented community needs, preferably as specified in a plan of service based on a community needs assessment.

All nominations that meet the Minister's Award for Excellence in Public Library Service criteria will be automatically eligible for the YOU Libraries Award. The YOU Libraries Award will be voted on by Albertans through an online vote. A website showcasing all eligible nominations will be provided to assist Albertans in making their choice.

Nominations will open on **December 1, 2017**, and the submission deadline is **February 23, 2018**. YOU Libraries voting will open at 10:00 a.m. (MST) on March 19, 2018 and close at 4:30 p.m. (MST) on March 23, 2018.

Nomination forms and additional details will be available at albertalibraries.ca.

Winners will be notified by early April 2018 and announced at the Alberta Library Conference in Jasper from April 26 - 29, 2018.
