

Board Meeting Highlights September 14, 2019

This summary is designed to keep you informed about Peace Library System (PLS) activities and Board decisions. It is distributed to member councils, library boards and the PLS Board of Directors after each Board meeting.

PLS has received half of its 2019 provincial operating grant, with the rest pending approval of the new provincial budget.

The Board received the final report on the provincial 2018-2019 Indigenous Populations Grant as well as an update on library outreach services to Indigenous communities. The Director reported that half of the 2019-2020 Grant had been received.

Revisions were approved to the Provision of Municipal Library Services Policy, the Memorandum of Agreement for Library Board Services and the Agreement for the Provision of Library Services at a Library Service Point.

The Board received notification from the Grande Prairie Public Library Board that it wished to terminate the Memorandum of Agreement to provide resource sharing services for the region. These responsibilities will be assumed by PLS effective January 1, 2020.

With the resignation of Beth Gillis (Town of High Level), alternate Camille Zavisha (Village of Hines Creek) will act as the Area 1 (Peace) representative on the Alberta Library Trustees Association Board.

The Consulting Services Manager reported that 40 libraries ran summer reading programs and PLS would be compiling statistics on participation. She also reported that the Niche Academy eResource now included Indigenous oral history videos from the MD of Opportunity.

As a result of discussion on SuperNet bandwidth for libraries, PLS will send a request to library boards and municipalities asking them write to Minister Glubish regarding bandwidth needs and possible solutions.

PLS launched a new fall marketing campaign called Save Money - Use Your Library. It will feature Facebook and radio ads, posters and bookmarks, and will challenge people to check their borrowing receipt to see how much they saved by using their local public library.

Four board members received long service recognition. Elaine Garrow (MD of Spirit River) and Reta Nooskey (Paddle Prairie Métis Settlement) were recognized for 15 years of service. Carolyn Kolebaba (Northern Sunrise County) and Ray Skrepnek (MD of Fairview) were recognized for 20 years of service.
